

How Do The Perkins Indicator Reports Compare to LaunchBoard Data?



Colleges are required to set goals for student outcomes on a number of Core Indicators for funding provided by the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act (Perkins). While there is an overlap in metrics between the Perkins reports and the LaunchBoard, these metrics are calculated in very different ways.

Which students are

cohort?

Includes students who:

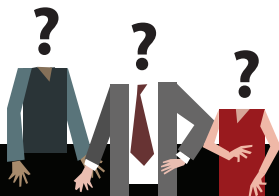
- took credit CTE courses
- had a valid social security number
- were not currently enrolled in K-12
- had not previously earned a certificate or degree
- **either** over the last three years, took 12+ CTE units in the program area
- or** earned a CTE certificate or degree

5 Metrics

- Technical skills attainment (based on GPA)
- Earned a degree, certificate, or became transfer ready
- Persistence (continuous enrollment in a community college) or transfer to a four-year institution
- Placement in a job
- Nontraditional participation and completion (based on gender)

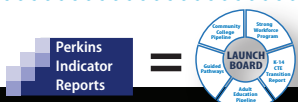
